

Analysing English Discourse

Language of instruction:	English
Form of teaching:	seminar
Class hours per week:	2
Credits (ECTS):	6
Course description:	This seminar course will aim at discussing different aspects of pragmatic meaning with respect to text and discourse. We will focus on certain inference types like implicature and presupposition in connection with the relevant inferential processes. In the course we will cover Speech Acts and the three kinds of forces utterances can have (locution, illocution, perlocution) and how they can vary with the context. At the macro level we will be discussing how conversations are structured.

Credits (ECTS):	6
Course description:	The lecture course aims to give an overview of the most critical social-cultural issues in United States society. We will explore a broad range of topics related to American society and culture. We will be addressing themes such as federalism, the government, the people's participation in decision making, race, ethnicity, education, and religion.

Course description:	The course surveys the new critical paradigms that have emerged in the field of American Studies since the 1990s, with particular focus on territoriality, sovereignty, gender, and the environment. The lectures provide interdisciplinary approaches to issues related to US history, politics, society, culture, and literature within the theoretical frameworks of Empire Theory, Masculinity Studies, and Ecocriticism.

	parts of a discourse analytic approach and the repertoire

	to more fully understand genres, film genres and to reveal
	how they work within American society.
