Short Description:		Beyond providing an introduction to the cultural history of Europe the course focuses on the impressive tangible and intangible cultural heritage of the area. The characteristics of current European culture will be also revealed by the course. Students will understand the role of the diverse cultural, educational, scientific, art, social and ecclesiastical institutions and movements in forming European culture. Students will learn about the most important events and personalities which shaped the European history, culture and science throughout the centuries. The course also provides an overview on the EU policies, initiatives and programs supporting Europe's cultural heritage.
