Course description:	<p>Depending on previous studies and study level, during the course, students will gain insight to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- The practicing and development of drawing skills as the base of the visual and imagery creation and through this the stimulation of a personal artistic way of observing, thinking and representing the world.- The development of drawing skills through imaginative drawings. The examination of color characters.- Acquiring knowledge of chromatology (relation between color and form, the color contrasts, the expressive features of colors, etc.) The overview of the artistic styles.- The emphasizing of the desired focus and the guidance of the attention over the surface of the painting. Drawing and painting of nudes and composing, placing the human body in a real and /or unreal space. Getting acquainted with the genre of the plein air and landscape.- The borders of painting after sight: painting after photos, the photorealism and hyperrealism.- The selection of the proper size and proportion of the painting support related to the chosen theme; the attainment of different ways of color application by the use of unorthodox tools.- The out- and overthinking of the painterly problem raised by the student and its realization and accomplishment by perpetual experimental creative work.

Anatomy for Artists I, III.

Language of instruction:	English

Course description:	<p>The goal of the Anatomy for Artists I. course is to hand over knowledge about the way the human skeleton is built up. The examination of the anatomical and physiological properties of the muscular structure and its static and dynamic functions. Finally, investigation of the proportions of the human body and the role of the skeleton and muscular system over its appearance.</p> <p>The goal of the Anatomy for Artists III. course is to hand over knowledge about the human skull and the muscles of the face and neck, stressing the role of the muscles of the face inducing the facial expressions. Moreover the course deals with the anatomical structure of the bones of the hip and the femur. The examination of the anatomical and physiological properties of the muscular structure of the hip and hip junction, and its static and dynamic functions.</p>

The examination of the anatomical and physiological properties of the muscular structure and its static and dynamic functions</p> <p>The goal of the Anatomy for Artists IV. course is to hand over knowledge about the bones and muscles of the leg and foot. The examination of the anatomical and physiological properties of the muscular structure of the leg and foot and its static and dynamic functions. The last part of the course examines the changing of the human figure proportions due to growth and the differences in proportions between male and female human figures. The course ends with as short overview of the way some artists saw and represented the human body.</p>
